

Report on the progress of the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC), June 16, 1933. The Civilian Conservation Corps moved with amazing speed to employ young men. Within three months of its creation it had enrolled almost a quarter million workers. Nearly 100,000 were already working in CCC camps. This report to FDR's aide Louis Howe details progress made by June 16, 1933.
